COURSE DESCRIPTION: HUM 2461 is an introductory survey of the humanities of Latin America in the context of history and culture studies. The course explores significant aspects of the art, architecture, cinema, customs, drama, history, languages, literature, music, philosophy, and religions of the nations, peoples, and societies of Latin America. Geographically, the course covers from Cape Horn at the southern tip of South America to the borderlands of the United States and French-speaking North America (Haiti, Québec, French-speaking Caribbean Islands) in the north; chronologically, the course begins with pre-Columbian cultures (c. 2500 BCE) and it ends in the twenty-first century.

COURSE LANGUAGE: The language of instruction is English, but references will be made to Spanish, Portuguese, French, and, tangentially, native languages such as Náhuatl, Maya, and Quechua, as each of them relate to various Latin American expressions in the humanities. Note that there are as many as 700 languages are spoken by about 400,000,000 people in Latin America.

OUTCOMES: Competency in contextualized cultural situations including problem solving, role playing, past and future cultural issues, exploration of the cultural diversity, traditions, and products of the humanities as developed in Latin America.

Class Attendance and Participation:

ATTENDANCE: Active participation is an integral part of Santa Fe College humanities courses. Therefore, it is imperative that every student take an active role in the class by listening, speaking, and answering questions. Attendance points are part of the final grade (see above; one point is given for each day of attendance).

requesting an incomplete from the instructor. Note: "I" grades are automatically changed to "F" if not completed by the conclusion of the next major term (i.e., Fall 2017).

NOTE on humanities extra credit cultural experience reaction paper (20 points extra credit):

- ➤ Go to any event related to Latin American (or Latinos in the United States) humanities/culture in Alachua County or any city in Florida;
- Write a reaction paper in English or Spanish (300 words);

- ➤ Write your reaction to the event by (A) briefly describing the event (where, what, when, which of the various humanities) and by focusing on any of these issues: (B) What is uniquely "Latin American" about the event; (C) What does the event say about contemporary Latin America; (C) What's your own personal reaction?
- ➤ 2 of the 20 points are awarded for putting the "word count" on your paper.

NOTE on Latin American humanities film report: (80 points)

Choose one of the approved films (see Canvas and online textbook):

- View it both critically (analytically) and for enjoyment;
- View it in connection, especially, in terms of the major themes for this course (see website List of Key Terms)
- Write one-page preliminary statement (300 words) of your film choice: include the word count in your written paper (1 point for word count). A maximum of half (one paragraph) of this one-page paper can be a recitation of the plot; the other half (one paragraph) must be analysis including reference to 2 of the course's Key Terms; the last sentence should be your personal reaction; due by midnight of the midterm examination (10 points);
- Present your thoughts on the film in a 15-minute class presentation and discussion (30 points): all presentations will be made in class after the midterm examination; any format is allowed: discussion with note cards (you may not read from a fully written paper); PowerPoint and discussion; webpage; video; etc. (30 points)
- Write a three-page (900 words maximum) analysis of the film by expanding on the preliminary essay structure outlined above; due on last day of class; due on April 20th by midnight. (40 points)
